Seeking Guidance from Elders

Importance of Elders:

- Somalis seek the advice of elders before taking any significant action.

Criteria for Being Considered an Elder:

- **Age**
- **Socioeconomic Status**
- **Authority**
- **Clan Chiefs and Religious Leaders:** Titles such as **Ugaas** (clan chief) or **Sheikh** (religious leader) signify recognized elder authority.



Problem-Solving Role of Elders

- **Elders as Problem-Solvers:**
 - Elders play a crucial role in resolving disputes and issues within the community.
- **Utilization of “Xeer” (customary law):**
 - System employed by elders to guide their decisions.
 - Built on established practices and historical cases, ensuring consistency in rulings.
 - The principles are deeply respected within Somali culture, reinforcing the authority of elders.



Understanding Somali Customary Law: “Xeer”

- **Definition:**
 - “Xeer” is an unwritten, centuries-old body of law developed by pastoral and farming communities in Somalia.
- **Characteristics:**
 - Oral tradition and community-based practice.



Oral Tradition and Elder-Based Mediation

- **Oral Tradition:**
 - Principles and precedents of “Xeer” are passed down orally through generations.
- **Elder-Based Mediation:**
 - Disputes are settled by elders known as “**xeer begti**” or “**odeyaal**”.
 - Elders act as mediator-judges, with authority based on wisdom, experience, and respect within their clan.



Emphasis on Consensus

Consensus-Building:

- Elders deliberate in a public council, known as “**shir.**”
- Adult males of the community may attend.
- The process continues until a consensus-based resolution is reached.



Focus on Compensation

- **Restorative Justice:**
 - “Xeer” emphasizes compensation for the victim rather than punitive justice.
 - Collective responsibility can obligate a clan to pay “blood money” (“mag” or “diya”) for offenses like murder or theft.



The Role of Women in Somali Eldership

- **Women in Peace-Making:**
 - While men traditionally dominate the role of elders, women play a crucial role in peacemaking within the community.
- **Emerging Leadership:**
 - In recent years, women have begun to be appointed as clan chiefs, known as “**Ugaaso**”.
- **Cultural Resistance:**
 - This new tradition faces resistance and is often disregarded by some Somali men, highlighting ongoing gender dynamics in leadership roles.



Parallel Justice System (“Xeer”) and Sharia Influence

- **Parallel Justice System:**

- “Xeer” is widely used for resolving domestic matters, resource management, and criminal offenses, even in areas with formal courts.
- Provides a cost-effective and accessible alternative to the state judiciary.



- **Sharia Influence:**

- Though “Xeer” predates Islam in Somalia, it has been influenced by Islamic legal principles that inform the elders' decisions.
